Note: Pay attention to the format of your source. “In print” means you are holding the print copy of the source. “Library database” means you are using a database such as POWER Library or EBSCO. “Free Web” means that you found the information on the internet.

E-mail Interview	Whiting, Jennifer A. E-mail interview. 2 – 10 Dec. 2010.

eBooks

Note: Cite an eBook the same way you would cite a print version of the book, except after the publication date, italicize the source of the eBook, add the medium of publication, and the date of access.

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Electronic Sources

Note: Listed below are the items you should try to find when citing electronic sources. Not every source will provide all of the information. Use the given examples for correct punctuation and format.

- Author and/or editor names (if available)
- Title of the article or document in quotation marks (if applicable)
- Title of the Website in italics
- Name of the organization that published the site (if not available write N.p.)
- Date the site was last updated, modified, or copyrighted written in the format: day month year (if not available write n.d.)
- Web.
- Day month and year you found the site
- URL
